Random Thoughts God is Good. Be Still. Feel Christ's Heart.

We all have random thoughts pop into our minds. Sometimes they are short, quick thoughts as those listed above. No explanation, no further in depth thought to them.

Be Still. Did each of you take time to be still at the NSWO Convention? Each time I walked into the "Stations of a Healthy Heart"

What Really Happens at an NSWO Convention?

For those of you who have never attended a convention of the Nebraska Synodical Women's Organization or any other synodical convention have you ever wondered what really happens?

At the 2009 NSWO Convention, it all began on Friday morning with the setting up of the displays and preparing the environment for the plenary sessions and worship to embrace the theme "Be Still and Feel Christ's Heart Within You." The altar, with the cross, is in place during the whole convention to remind us Christ is at the center of all that we do. This year the committee borrowed the idea from the Nebraska Synod Assembly Committee using colorful pieces of material on the tables in the plenary area making it look like a large quilt. This material was then used to make sewing kits for Lutheran World Relief.

The NSWO Board meets at the beginning of convention to receive assignments, bring the last business forward before the election of the new board, and of course eat together. Devotions at this meeting get us centered on the theme of the convention.

At 2:00 p.m. Friday, registration started with women signing in and delegates turning in their credentials to receive their voting packets. Signing up for workshops also takes place at this time. This year women also had the opportunity to sign up for the "Run, Walk, and Roll" which took place very early Saturday morning. Eleven women had signed up prior to arriving at convention and had collected \$728.00. Twelve ladies signed up on Friday and were given a challenge to get as many pledges as possible with a prize awarded to the one collecting the most money on Friday. These ladies collected \$630.93 for a grand total of \$1,358.93. Way to go, ladies!

Two sessions of workshops were held that afternoon and after dinner the women returned to the

convention center for a worship and healing service led by Bishop David deFreese and Pastor Connie Raess. After worship, Anita deFreese helped us become acquainted with women from all around the synod by having us participate in a mixer (game). To the toot of a train whistle, and according to the number of toots, we were to form groups of that size and then each women was to answer the question asked at that time. It was great fun and helped the women become more comfortable in speaking with strangers. Brownies and coffee topped off the evening.

Saturday morning twenty-three women rose early and participated in the "Run, Walk, and Roll." This was about a mile walk on Betty's Trail in Yanney Heritage Park; the money raised was for Women of the ELCA initiative – "Raising up Healthy Women and Girls."

Delegates went through orientation prior to the gathering music, led by the worship team and then Bible study led by Bishop deFreese.

The first plenary session began with the official opening of the convention and introductions of speakers, worship leaders, the CWO Representative, special guests, the Parliamentarian, and the convention Chaplain. The plenary sessions follow an agenda with a script to keep everything on track

Robert's using Rules of Order. Appointing of committees and kev people are some of pieces of business followed by the first vote for president. This vote is nominating vote where anyone's name mav be submitted. It is

sometimes called an ecclesiastical ballot. For someone to win the election on this ballot, one person would need to receive three-fourths of the votes. Throughout the convention and especially before each vote, Pastor Connie led us in prayer.

We were blessed to have the President of Women of the ELCA, Beth Wrenn, with us for the entire convention and while waiting for the results of the first vote she gave her presentation.

Without an election on the first ballot, we went to the second ballot where a person needs to win by two-thirds of the votes. People not wishing their name to remain on the ballot may have it removed by speaking at the microphone. We took a short coffee break before the keynote address.

We were privileged to hear from our keynote speaker, Patty Morrison, who talked to us about the times of our lives.

In plenary session two, it was announced that a third ballot for president was needed with the names of the two people who received the most votes

on this ballot. This vote requires a simple majority for an election.

It was time for lunch. At this year's convention, we were hosted at breakfast and lunch tables by women that had participated in a "Saved to Serve" opportunity. Each table was decorated to depict what servant duties had taken place at a specific event. Many women learned more about Saved to

Serve and were given the opportunity to sign up for the 2010 events.

When we returned for plenary session three, the Committee on Elections reported Gwendolynn Edwards had received the majority of the votes and President Beth Meyer declared an election. Gwen addressed the convention and accepted the position of NSWO President.

Election of NSWO officers followed with Leslie Marchando-Cook elected vice-president, Jane

Johnson elected secretary, and Nancy Johnson elected treasurer. This was followed by the election of the conference representatives.

President Beth Meyer gave her report by using a PowerPoint showing pictures of events from the past four years and women she met during her past four years as president. The tune accompanying her presentation was "Faces of Our Friends" by Celia Whitler. We indeed do see God's presence in the faces of these women.

The rest of the afternoon was spent in two sessions of workshops, servant room activities, and fellowship with cookies and punch. You could take time to meditate in the "Stations of a Healthy Heart" room, set up with appropriate activities at each station. This is a piece included in the "Journey to Wellness" resource.

Sunday morning started with the fourth plenary and final session. Election of Delegates to the Triennial Convention of Women of the ELCA in Spokane, Washington, July 12-14, 2011, was the first thing on the agenda. The following were

elected as delegates: Tara Bahnfleth, Carol Bierman, Lynn Echternkamp, Fran Hughes, Terri Johnson, Lanetta Kellogg, Shirley Kehne, Emily Laaker, and Mary Mayfield. The SWO presidents are also delegates.

The treasurer's report was approved and upon recommendation of the NSWO Board the budget for 2010-2011 was adopted. The Financial Review for 2008-2009 was approved as presented.

Resolutions brought to the convention and approved were:

- A courtesy resolution showing appreciation to the convention committee, the hotel staff, and all those involved in putting on a successful convention.
- A resolution that a Saved to Serve Reunion be held at each NSWO convention. Invitations will

- be sent to all participants of the events that have been held since the previous convention.
- One resolution was referred to the 2011 NSWO Convention Committee concerning past president's presentations taking place at a time other than Sunday morning.

The generosity of the women of this organization is phenomenal. Our Mission/Convention Offering totaled \$6,411.50. This will be divided ½ to CWO and ½ to Katie's Fund. Our worship offering will be given to Lutheran Campus Ministries of Nebraska. The committee on offerings counted this offering and the amount will be reported in the next *Expressions*. The Tangible offering of items for health and school kits was amazing. That report is page 13.

Throughout the convention there were times to visit the displays of the serving arms of the Nebraska Synod and of the convention committees. The final bids were taken on the linens from Argentina with the highest bidders announced on Saturday night.

Yes, there is the business that needs to be completed; however, with the worship and workshops to help us on our faith journey, or teach us how to be a leader, or teach us to pray, or learn what it is to be a Mary in a Martha world, or help do

a service project, the convention becomes more than just a business meeting. Fellowship is always a big part of the

convention.

We give without expecting anything in return, which means when a smile or greeting comes to us, it really feels like it is coming from God.

The women giving of themselves represent the many gifts or talents at the convention. I ask what may be a difficult question of each one of you. Do you accept your gifts or talents with a joyful heart? When somebody compliments you on a job well done, can you accept it as what it is? God has called you. You have responded. and scarves because of the number of women I was able to greet and get to know a little bit Tables were used in workshops for displays and interactive guidance, hands on Tables were used to display experiences. everything from information about our agencies, the various aspects of our own Nebraska Synodical Women's Organization, missions around the world, and there was a table that could be used for prayer requests. We ate at different tables, with different women for each meal, around the room. One of the most important tables was the Communion table. We were a part of something that day that ties us to the past when Christ first instituted it. We were in communion with all Christians everywhere at that moment in time. It is truly awesome, isn't it?

Where we had been separated into specific groups for the purpose of the meetings, preparation was made before with Gathering music to create a unifying space. When we started the Worship Service, we were all one body in Christ. All of the usual parts of the Worship were present, Gathering, Confession, Word, Message, Meal. In addition to these parts, we had installation of the new NSWO Board. CWO President Wrenn did the The part of the Service I want to installing. mention here, was the Sending. We were told to "Go in Peace and Serve the Lord." This is always poignant to me. When we leave we have so much to share; it is hard to figure out where to start first. This piece of writing is one way for me to share this Convention with other women. Encouraging women to go to the next event is another. Growing love and trust with all of my sisters in Christ is indeed very important to me.

May God Bless, Encourage, Empower each one of my sisters in Christ Jesus.

May each one "Be Still and Know God."

May each woman then pursue what God has indeed called her to do.

It was a great celebration for the Lakota Center and Chapel, the community, the Nebraska Synod, and for all who have given their support to the center's work and ministry. Please continue to remember this important ministry with your prayers and support.

Did you see all those First Timers? 26.56% of our attendance was First Timers, a total of 51. That is awesome! Get them involved in your local



Saved to Serve Opportunity Focuses on Prison Ministry

New insight into prison ministry was the prime result of the Saved To Serve Opportunity held July 10-12 based out of Our Saviour's Lutheran Church in Lincoln. Twenty-three women from across Nebraska participated including nine women attending an opportunity for the first time.

The weekend serving retreat featured an interactive presentation by Pastor Wm Barth, director of Prison Ministries for the NE Synod of the ELCA, who emphasized that compassion is the key to prison ministry. Jim Brewer and Jan Redman explained the prison ministry programs at Our Saviour's including

The FEAST which stands for <u>Friends Eating And Singing</u>, studying and sharing <u>Together</u>.

Each Sunday, church members who serve as inmate sponsors take a bus to pick up work release inmates from the Community Corrections Center to bring them to church. Following the worship service, prisoners and their sponsors, families and friends share lunch, singing, Bible study, prayers, and fellowship.

As a part of the weekend experience, Saved To Serve participants toured the Community Correctional Center in Lincoln and the Bridge To Hope Warehouse which assists former prisoners with clothing and household items to get started in the community.

Half of the women worked at the warehouse unpacking the more than seventy boxes of donations brought to the event, marking and sorting clothing, washing dishes, and cleaning.

A second group sewed curtains to help create a cheery environment for the mothers and children staying at St. Monica's House, which is part of a substance abuse program. A third group prepared a homemade lasagna dinner for 125 which was served for the FEAST Program on Sunday.

About the time the group planned to leave to sing as a choir at the Fellowship of Believers Worship Service at the Nebraska State Penitentiary, the prison was put on lock down. Plans were quickly rearranged and the women sang at the 5:30 p.m. service at Our Saviour's.

Other highlights included, an upbeat Sunday worship service including a celebration of affirmation of faith by an inmate, a substance abuse presentation by Jody Busse, Bible study times, a special tour of the Arboretum on the University of Nebraska East Campus, and time to stroll through Lincoln's Sunken Gardens.
