

FROM THE PRESIDENT

Hello Friends of NSWO,

As I write this President's article today, I ask myself what is it that I can share with you to make a difference to you, to me, and to others. I can think of so many things that I would love to share with you about the work of Women of the ELCA at the Churchwide level, the synod level, and at our congregational unit level. I will share just a few for this publication. I do ask that you PLEASE PLEASE share my

Groups Come Together To Serve At NeLCM By SUSAN WATSON

When Saved To Serve participants, college students, and others gathered at the Nebraska Lutheran Campus Ministry Center in Kearney September 27, it was a beehive of activity to make the Center more attractive, and welcoming for students and to serve others.

A major project was making the Center's landscaping more appealing and manageable. STSO participants, students, and members of the Hole In The Roof Gang from Kearney removed unwanted plants, pulled weeds, trimmed bushes, removed a vine, and installed wheelbarrow after wheelbarrow of rock. Inside, the kitchen was cleaned and painted, fleece blankets were made, and Lutheran World Relief quilts were tied. In the afternoon, Chrismons, symbols of Christ, were created and decorated for the Center's two Christmas trees and LWR backpacks were stuffed with school supplies.

Eight of the fleece blankets were taken to the Kearney Crossroads Homeless Shelter where the women toured the facility and heard two residents tell their stories. In the evening, the group watched an informative showing of the night sky at the UNK planetarium.

Throughout the weekend, participants also learned about the important work of the Lutheran Campus Ministry Center from Pastor Rachel Ziese-Hacker and several students, gained added incites into the Bible story of Ruth, and experience a moving prayer service similar to ones the students have on Wednesday nights during the school year.



During the NeLCM Saved To Serve Opportunity, the participants and students assembled seventy-six school kits for Lutheran World Relief as a way of serving others.

Overnight accommodations were at Mosaic's 101-year-old Bethphage Village at Axtell which gave participants the opportunity to tour the campus Sunday morning before worship at First Lutheran in Kearney.

First Lutheran and Family of Christ of Kearney; Spirit of Hope, Holdrege; and Adullum and Immanuel from Bertrand provided delicious meals for the participants. Units across the state stocked the Center with paper products and cleaning supplies and contributed enough money to purchase the dishwasher wished for by Pastor Hacker and the students.

Additionally, Thrivent Financial Action Team cards helped purchase fleece, Christmas trees, Chrismon, and kitchen supplies, a hedge trimmer, grass seed, other items needed for the projects and some refreshments.



The Charlotte Convention Center was the location for the Ninth Triennial Convention and Gathering with more than 2,000 participants in attendance. Nebraska was well represented with over forty in attendance.

Women of the ELCA gathered in Charlotte, July 24-27 for a weekend of learning, inspiring speakers, worship, and service in the largest gathering of women in the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America. Of the over forty participants from Nebraska, twelve were voting delegates, one NSWO officer, and five NSWO Board Members. Ten of the eleven delegates were elected at the NSWO Convention in September 2013; our president Kandy Pflaster was the eleventh delegate by virtue of office; and the additional delegate was Churchwide Executive Board Member Gwendolynn Edwards.


On the fourth ballot delegates elected Patti Austin, Lilburn, Ga., as the Churchwide Women of the ELCA president. Austin said she looks forward with "great anticipation to see what God has in store for us in the next 25 years. I know we will continue to nurture the seed of faith that was planted, knowing that it will continue to develop and grow into an active and vibrant ministry beyond anything we could have ever imagined because this is the mystery of the kingdom of God." Austin currently serves on the churchwide executive board and is a former vice president of Southeastern Synodical Women's Organization and former president of her congregational unit."

Jody Smiley, Blacksburg, VA, was elected vice president; Becky Shurson, Yucaipa, Calif., secretary; and Ely Smith, Parkland, Wash., treasurer. This was my first time attending the Gathering and I can say with certainty that it will not be my last! It's hard for me to pinpoint a certain thing; there are so many things that made this memorable for me. Meeting Presiding Bishop Eaton, worshipping with my Lutheran sisters, making new friends, hanging out with old ones, and seeing such a beautiful city are all great memories. I think that the one thing I truly learned was more about what the Women of the ELCA do. As a Board Representative, I feel that it's important for me to know more about what we do together, locally, state wide, and nationally. I feel more knowledgeable but I know I still have so much to learn! Thank you for your prayers as we continue on this journey together."

Southern Prairie Board Rep Ann Schultz said, "Where do I begin to share the highlights of my trip to Charlotte, NC? My first Women of the ELCA Triennial did not disappoint! We gathered under the theme "of many generations." How exciting to be there with six...YES...six generations of women! Presiding Bishop Eaton shared something that I cannot forget..."What are we doing if we just hold on to that good feeling of having Jesus Christ in our life and NOT share that experience with others in this world?" We need to show and share our relationship with Jesus Christ. We are the role models for the future. The Rev Susan Sparks, who was a keynote speaker, an ex-attorney, a Baptist pastor, and also a comedian shared the message that we ALL laugh in the same language. There is no communication barrier. The power of humor is when we can step back and use it to help get a different perspective. She put some good stories and laughs to one of God's greatest gifts to us...laughter. I am thankful for the opportunity to attend this Triennial. How can I describe the connection felt

Delegate Pearl Anderson said, "This was my first Triennial convention and gathering. As a delegate there was business to conduct. Among the resolutions passed was one to encourage each unit to educate the members on the plight of the unaccompanied children entering across our southern border. Since some of these children are arriving in Nebraska it is our responsibility to be informed. I would encourage attendance at the Gathering. It is a wonderful opportunity to hear speakers that will inform, motivate, and inspire you. This could be the only opportunity to hear some of these speakers. It is an opportunity

to meet women of faith from across the nation and of all ages. It can be a weekend get-away with girlfriends for you to relax, refresh, and renew your body and spirit to be ready to lead your units into a new year."

Delegate Sandy Boots said, "360 delegates elected by each of the sixty-four synodical women's organizations, took action on several social justice issues, including human trafficking, bullying, creating safe places, the current immigration crisis involving children and approved the 2015 budget of nearly \$3 million. These actions call into action every expression of Women of the ELCA—congregational units, synodical women's organizations, and the churchwide women's organization. We also approved several housekeeping items to update the Women of the ELCA constitution. We encouraged many ministries around the world supported by the Women of the ELCA.

Delegate Mary Mayfield said, "The business of the Ninth Triennial Convention was the election of officers/ executive board for the 2014-2017 term. Patti Austin, a former regional retail manager from Decatur, Georgia and motivational speaker was elected President of the Women of the ELCA. Jody Smiley, an analytical chemist and environmental engineer at Virginia Tech was chosen as Vice President. Becky Shurson, account executive from Yucaipa, California is our new Secretary and Ely Smith from Fircrest Washington, also an accountant was elected as Treasurer. Our very own Gwendolynn Edwards from Bellevue, Nebraska was the highest vote getter and was re-elected to the executive board along with sixteen other very qualified women.

Delegate Beth Meyer said, "Attending the Convention as a delegate means that I get to participate in the decision making of Women of the ELCA. This has been a passion of mine since the first time that I was a delegate in St. Louis and even when I am not a delegate I enjoy sitting at all the plenary sessions. This year was no different from the other six I have attended in the past. The excitement of the election of the President, Vice-President is an awesome process. The expectation of finally hearing the name of the new president is a thrill to see how God has worked in the hearts and minds of the voting members. Not quite on the level of electing a bishop, but almost.

The Gathering is also filled with great speakers and of course the worship services are the highlight. To be in communion with 2,400 sisters in Christ is an uplifting experience that will keep you coming back to the next

Delegate Carol Stark said, "Sisters in Christ of many generations. As I begin to write this for the Expressions I am saddened by the loss of my mother-in-law a couple of days ago. Her generation went through many changes in her lifetime. Her family went through the Great Depression and they saw war come to the family, but through that they remained a close knit family. With her passing we are losing one of her generation but because of her the generations will live on. At the Triennial we had a place to meet our sisters in "The Dor" which means generation in Hebrew. I meet and made new friendships with those sisters at the meetings, workshops, and servant events. We had fun with our sisters from Rockin' Region 4 and hopefully you



will have seen some of the pictures from the event. I was very blessed to serve as one of your delegates for the Triennial. The Holy Spirit was among and surrounding us as we elected our new President Patti Austin of Georgia and the rest of the board that represent and educate us about the issues we see in our world today. We had awesome speakers in Becca Stevens of Thistle Farms. Susan Sparks a pastor, stand up comedian, and lawyer. Presiding Bishop Elizabeth Eaton brought us the love of Christ and how we can help our fellow sisters. Stephanie Burke brought Jesus to life in her art and even had women at the Triennial help with the art that came to real life at the closing worship on Sunday. I look forward to sharing the Triennial events with you as we see each other at future events. Thank you for letting me be a part of this blessed Triennial."



What is the Women's Health Initiative?

In 2004, the Women of the ELCA created a church wide health initiative called **Raising Up Healthy Women and Girls**. This initiative seeks to help women and girls make healthy spiritual, physical and emotional choices in their lives. The primary way the Women's Health Initiative is funded is by the Run, Walk and Roll held at Triennial Gathering. We have also had this event at our conventions for several years. This year we decided to use our Winter Retreat offering to contribute to this valuable program.

How is the funding used?

- From the funds of the Women's Health Initiative the Women of the ELCA has co-sponsored the federal HEART Act
 for Women. Raising Up Healthy Women and Girls focuses on the importance of taking care of our
 hearts...physically, emotionally and spiritually.
- Seed Grant Programs are offered to congregational units who are expanding and growing their work within the
 initiative. (Health Fairs, Exercise Events, Healthy Cooking Classes, Spa Days, etc.) Seed Grants were given to Women
 of the ELCA units to continue raising awareness, educating and promoting wellness among women and girls. The
 Planting Seeds for a Healthy Tomorrow resource was created to help understand about the seed grants. Every unit
 that receives a seed grant is expected to "seed" back the initiative with some money. It's a wonderful circle of
 stewardship! Generally stories of the seed grants appear in the Interchange.

How do we learn about the health initiative?

Resources are necessary to help women in our organization understand and support the health initiative. A Journey
to Wellness is a discussion starter program resource. Sacred Spaces and Shared Wisdom, Knitting as a Spiritual
Practice and The Faces of Grief are all program resources addressing emotional, spiritual and physical health. There
are many more and many more to come!

As with any initiative, it is an ongoing effort. It was started in 2005 and won't stop until we're all emotionally, spiritually and physically healthy...which means this will be going on for quite a while!

In June the NSWO Board met and decided that our organization would establish a fund to sponsor a missionary for our women's units in Nebraska. There has been one donation to the Missionary Sponsorship Fund of \$66. It was so incredible to receive that first donation towards this wonderful action. The need is great for sponsorships--10 new missionaries went through orientation in July. Our organization could do a minimum sponsorship or the maximum of \$25,000. Either is being sought to support their service in 2015. Also there were sixty-four young adults scheduled for orientation in mid-August before they fly to their countries of service. Also, at the closing worship service at the Ninth Triennial Gathering the offering provided \$20,824.53 for scholarships for international women leaders, a program of ELCA Global Church Sponsorship.
