

Discipleship, Justice, and Stewardship

You may have noticed in the recently mailed Change of Officer forms, that we are no longer asking units to have Mission Growth, Mission Action, and Mission Community committee leaders. This may seem strange to us in Nebraska since through our synod under the leadership of Bishop David deFreese, we are all about MISSION! Our churches are "Mission Centers;" we talk about the "Mission Field;" and our Nebraska Synod motto is "We Do So, the first thing I want to Mission!" emphasize is that this change does not mean the Women of the ELCA no longer focus on mission.

First they recognize that units are not necessarily traditionally structured with multiple committees. Secondly, they are using words that make it clear to all who read them, what type of mission we are called to do:

Discipleship to help us *grow* to discern God's call, understand God's gifts and respond to God's presence in our lives. This includes our Bible studies, retreats, and other programs to strengthen us in these areas.

Justice to *actively* work in justice and advocacy, and to faithfully carry out our vision of bringing healing and wholeness to the world. This includes work on domestic violence, commercial sexual exploitation, and environmental justice.

Stewardship to be in *community* with others by providing assistance to them through our stewardship dollars as well as to help one another by using our talents and time. This includes our support of the ministries of the Women of the ELCA through our

Thankofferings and our purchases of fair trade goods such as coffee and chocolate. Our Saved to Serve activities could be part of this area of emphasis.

These areas will often overlap as we plan our programs and projects for the year. Both the Interchange newsletter and the women's website, www.womenoftheelca.org, offer free resources for programs and longer events. Resources can also be used by individuals for personal faith growth. The February 2011 Interchange featured an article with this same title where I gleaned some of the information I listed above. It listed resources available from the Women of the ELCA in each area. You can view all of the past newsletters on the website and have access to print a multitude of program resources. If you see something in the Interchange you receive in the mail, you can also phone the Women of the ELCA's 800-number and they will send you a copy.

As you look at the website, you will see that program resources are clearly connected to our purpose statement. In fact the resources links are titled using words from that statement. Many programs could easily fit in two or more of the areas. I encourage you to explore the website and the resources for Growing in Faith; Affirming Our Gifts; Supporting One Another in Our Callings; Engaging in Ministry and Action; and Promoting Healing and Wholeness.

By planning your unit's programs and activities with discipleship, justice, and stewardship as your primary focus, you will truly meet the purpose of our organization and serve the Lord each time you come together.

Triennial Report 2011

Wow! Each time I attend a triennial, it is better than the last! I thoroughly enjoyed this convention. The accommodations were well thought-out. The hotel where the delegates stayed is connected by a walkway to the convention center. The meals were served in the hall adjoining the business meeting space, so we got to meet some of the guest speakers and CWO board members as we ate. Bishop of the Slovak Zion Synod, Rev. Wilma Kucharek, presented a Bible study dwelling on the lesser-known women in the Bible.

Leymah Gbowee spoke at one of the plenary sessions. She has since been awarded the Noble Peace Prize, along with two other women. She led her people of Liberia in protest of all the violence in her country. She challenged us to dare to work for peace in this country—especially in cases of bigotry and bullying. HER VIDEO, *Pray the Devil Back to Hell* was shown during the Gathering session.

Bishop Mark Hanson spoke to us about the upcoming Churchwide ELCA Assembly. The theme will be "Freed in Christ to Serve". He stressed that we identify ourselves by our connectedness, not by divisiveness. We are connected to both the Jewish and the Islamic faiths. ELCA Lutherans work for peace and justice throughout the world, not just in the U.S. He presented the 1% Challenge and the It Gets Better Initiative. We will hear more about these throughout the year to come.

Nora Gallagher shared her faith as she worked through a difficult time in her life, fearing the loss of the eyesight. Her advice is to always live in the present; to concentrate on what is real in the present, and not spend precious time and energy lamenting the past or worrying about the future.

Rev. Megan Torgerson, spoke at the closing worship. Her topic was Enough. We should be content with Enough, not always wanting more.

Attending a Triennial is a great opportunity that I hope you will be able to enjoy sometime.

Mission Field Nebraska

God is at work in our lives in powerful and profound ways. God wants us to make a difference in the lives of those around us, and that's what our Mission Field Nebraska ministries do... they do mission!

Mission Field Nebraska is our outreach to our neighbors here in the Nebraska Synod, providing spiritual and physical care to many who need it. These multicultural and socioeconomic ministries are made possible through God's grace, through the love and care shown by those who serve, and by generous financial support.

The needs are great. Here is a sampling of the work being done through Mission Field Nebraska and what it takes to make it happen.

- \$9,000 a year allows Lakota Lutheran Center and Chapel in Scottsbluff to offer a soup kitchen three days a week, providing a good hot meal to those who might not otherwise get one.
- \$3,000 a month provides pastoral leadership and care at a Mission Field Nebraska ministry site, such as Fontenelle Community Lutheran Church in North Omaha, Iglesia Luterana Cristo Rey in South Omaha, or United Southeast Asian Ministry in Dakota City.
- \$8,000 a year helps provide theological education for the pastoral leadership at the Nile Lutheran congregation housed within Trinity Lutheran Church in Omaha.
- \$1,200 a week allows Table Grace Café in Downtown Omaha to provide a place for people of all economic backgrounds to share food and fellowship with one another while providing job skills training to people in search of employment.
- \$7,000 a month provides pastoral leadership and program support for Nebraska Synod Prison Ministries and Followers of Christ worship within the Nebraska State Penitentiary.
- \$4,000 a year provides rent support from the Nebraska Synod to The Welcome Center in Lexington, Lutheran Family Services' ministry providing low-cost legal services to newcomers.
- \$4,500 a month allows Lutheran Metro Ministries in North Omaha to provide emergency assistance and a food pantry to those in need.
- \$1,000 provides English-Second Language classes to five individuals through the Todos los Hijos deDios ministry in Southeast Nebraska.

Through Mission Field Nebraska, lives have been changed, hope has been made known, and the love of God has been shared. This is possible because of your support and participation. On behalf of those who serve and are served, thank you for your support of our Mission Field Nebraska ministries.

One-fourth of the offerings collected at the seven Spring Gatherings held this year will be donated to Mission Field Nebraska.

April 21, High Plains Conference will be held at St. John's Lutheran Church in Eustis. We will have registration starting at 8:45 a.m. There will be a presentation from the Welcome Center of Lexington. The Welcome Center will also receive part of our offering that day. We also will present a skit that was done at Convention and a presentation from a spiritual advisor called Talking Sticks. We will be celebrating our Lord's blessings.

May 5, Southern Praire Conference will be held at Salem in Superior. Save the date and plan to join friends as we: Experience a quilted program about Women of the Old and New Testaments. Years after her experiment, she interviews these children as adults who remembered it well and saw it as life changing.

GRANTS, SCHOLARSHIPS APPLICATIONS DUE

February 15 marks the deadline for two important annual programs of Women of the ELCA: grants and scholarships.

Agencies and non-profits that support healing and wholeness for women of all ages are invited to apply for a 2012 grant from Women of the ELCA. Last year grants were given to teen parent mentoring programs, therapeutic support groups for adolescent girls who are victims of sexual trauma, culinary and life-skills training for women stuck in poverty, seminars for survivors of domestic and sexual violence and peacemaking training, among others. If you know of similar agencies and non-profits in your community, encourage them to apply. Details are available at womenoftheelca.org.

Scholarships are available for women who are members of the ELCA. There are scholarships for Lutheran laywomen who are studying for a career other than ordained ministry as well as scholarships for those in their final year at an ELCA seminary. The other scholarships fall into two administrative categories: for women administrators and faculty at ELCA colleges and seminaries who are participating in leadership training or management training institutes and for women interested in reaching the top of their fields as administrators. Last year 24 women received scholarships from Women of the ELCA. Encourage someone you know to apply today. Details are available at womenoftheelca.org.
