Women of the ELCA awards a 2012 Grant to an organization in Nebraska Synod

Lutheran Family Services of Nebraska, The Centers for Healthy Families, receives a \$2,000.00 grant.

The centers provide early

intervention and prevention programming to reduce risk of child neglect and abuse for low-income, at-risk families who have a child under five years of age or are pregnant.

The granting funds to organizations and programs that support that needs and the development of women is one way we fulfill the purposes of Women of the ELCA. Since 1990 our grants in support of women and children have totaled over three and a half million dollars.

As part of the our application review process our synodical women's organizations were asked to comment on the applications received from their synod, thus helping the churchwide organization make informed choices from among the many worthy applications submitted. It is our prayer that through projects we support this year Women of the ELCA will continue to make a strong and positive difference in the lives of women and their families throughout this country and aboard.

Luke 5: 27 -31, NIV

After this, Jesus went out and saw a tax collector by the name of Levi sitting at his tax booth, "Follow me," Jesus said to him, and Levi got up, left everything and followed him.

Then Levi held a great banquet for Jesus at his house, and a large crowd of tax collectors and others were eating with them. But the Pharisees and the teachers of the law who belonged to their sect complained to his disciples, "Why do you eat and drink with tax collectors and sinners?"

Jesus answered them, "It is not the healthy who need a doctor, but the sick. I have not come to call the righteous, but the sinners to repentance."

On World Communion Sunday our choir anthem was "One at the Feast".

He ate bread at their tables, he joined them in their feast, And many asked the Savior, "Why do you dine with these, the outcast and the sinner, the dying and the poor? There are many greater than these you sit before."

So let the poor and the wealthy be seated side be side, The hungry and the thirsty with those who have been fed, And share the feast together, come share the wine and bread.

Gather at the table, come and take your place. There is room for many at the feast of grace. With the wine remember, with the wine recall Jesus gave his body and his blood for all.

Break the bread and pour the wine, let them drink, let

them dine. None is greater than the least, all are one, one at the feast.

I got to thinking. Who are the least in our communities? Who do we tend to regard as not worthy? The unwed mother who is trying to turn her life around? The little girl who is violated by her daddy, and the whole town knows, but no one does anything?

The family who comes to church wearing worn and tattered clothing and always stays for coffee fellowship and stuffs their pockets? Is it the first bi-racial couple you have ever met? Or the son of the town drunk who showed up for confirmation classes? Who of us do we consider to be righteous?

I remember the e-mail that went around, telling of a stranger who came to the church wearing dirty and torn clothing. No one greeted him, and he got the feeling that no one wanted him to sit in their pew. He slowly made his way to the front and sat on the floor right ahead of the first pew thinking he would not bother anybody there.

Some in the congregation noticed that one of the ushers also made his way to the front. They wondered how he would get the man to leave. But, instead, the usher sat down on the floor beside him. What a message for all! What a way to show the love of God for all his people!

Who does Jesus regard as worthy? Let us remember that Jesus did die for all, not just for those who dress nicely and have the right background. Let us always invite and welcome everyone in Christ's name.

A poor widow came and put in two small copper coins, which are worth a penny. Then he called his disciples and said to them, "Truly I tell you, this poor widow has put in more than all those who are contributing to the treasury. For all of them have contributed out of their abundance; but she out of her poverty has put in everything she had, all she had to live on."

When I was asked to attend and speak to a congregation on a Thankoffering Sunday last year, I researched the Women of the ELCA website about Thankofferings. I found a wonderful presentation about the history of Thankofferings. That is when I discovered the above personal favorite Bible verse and Bible story. Here is another excerpt from the same resource:

Women's offerings: a brief history

The idea of collecting donations in small offering boxes goes back to the very early 1800s, when women formed "mite" or "cent" societies to raise money. Mite boxes were given out as fundraising tools to collect pennies for the support of church projects and foreign missionaries.

Many of you will be celebrating a Thankoffering service in your own church as November is often the month we celebrate as women. Your unit's should have received the Stewardship mailing from Churchwide which included a new worship for 2012 Thankoffering Service. You may also access this service on the website at www.womenoftheelca.org. Or you may choose to create one around the regular lectinary texts for a given Sunday, especially if those texts support discipleship or stewardship themes. There is also a recent publication in the *Interchange* and on the website about making your own personal Thankoffering boxes/jars/containers to use in your Thankoffering service

I invite you to share about what your unit does for their Thankoffering service with our *Expressions* readers; we would all like to know what others do to share in Christ's name and Good Works.

Discipleship, Justice, and now Stewardship

Having discussed the first two areas of focus in the Women of the ELCA, I turn to Stewardship. Our organization's website defines stewardship in this way:

- a. stewardship is careful and responsible management of the money, property, and resources that God has entrusted us.
- b. stewardship is providing for the ministries that God has entrusted to our care.

Earlier this week my *Daily Grace* e-mail from the Women of the ELCA was titled Growing Through Giving. (*Daily Grace* is the organization's first iPhone app, but you can also subscribe to the daily devotions via e-mail). Let me share it with you.

Which is greater: the church's need for our gifts, or our need to give the gifts?

Christ neither asks for help nor bargains for loyalty with those he helps. Rather he supplies what we need, and then asks us to go and help others. It's a pay-it-forward process.

In Matthew 6:21, Jesus tells us: "For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also." So why give? We might as well ask why breathe, sleep, or eat. Giving is intrinsic to our spiritual well-being just as these physical actions are to our physical well-being. Why give? Consider this:

God tells us to do so repeatedly.
Giving sets our priorities.
Giving encourages others.
Giving influences others.
Giving is good financial discipline.
Giving connects us.
Giving opens us up to new adventures.

As we give, we grow. Giving to the church is what sowing is to gardening. It plants possibilities. Both the givers and receivers benefit in the process.

Women of the ELCA offer several free resources on stewardship and giving. Visit www.womenoftheelca.org to find the current stewardship planning guide and Thankoffering service workbooks.

This message was adapted from Growing Through Giving written by Kathryn Haueisen Cashen that first appeared in the May 2010 issue of *Lutheran Woman Today* magazine.

Individually and as units we need to keep in mind how we can be good stewards. Many women use their quilting talents and time to repurpose fabric into quilts for LWR, Lutheran World Relief. We also need to share our monetary resources. Churchwide and our Synodical organization need funding to cover the expense of the programming they provide and the costs of leadership training and event planning. After all, we are together as a community of women supporting one another in our callings.

Women of the ELCA encourages and equips women to consider their responsibility and capacity for stewardship. Churchwide Staff members create educational resources about giving and managing money, including devotions, Bible studies, and program materials for individuals and small groups. Each unit president should have received the 2012-2013 Stewardship Guide in September mentioned above. This is a great written resource for devotions about stewardship and information about offerings. If you didn't get one, confirm that we have your correct address or see if it was mailed to your church.

You may have attended Autumn Renewal and already heard about the \$25 for 25 years challenge issued by the synodical presidents and vice-presidents of our Rockin' Region 4. If not, be sure to read about it in this newsletter. One question asked was if it was a single donation of \$25 or that much for each year. It is a single donation request but the question got me thinking. Would it really be that hard to increase our yearly giving by about \$2.00 each month? Skip one treat a month. For me that would be forgoing two ice cream cones at Runza. Maybe for others it would be driving past Starbucks instead of stopping in. Buy LWR fairly traded coffee and brew it at home. Then you are supporting mission at the same time. Remember LWR also has chocolate and teas and Olive oil and NSWO always has some to buy at our events.

So, I invite you to grow in your stewardship. Greater stewardship equates to greater and more outreach and mission as Women of the ELCA moves into the next 25 years.

The East Autumn Renewal was held at Lord of Love Church in Omaha on September 15. One hundred plus ladies attended. We again want to thank the ladies of the church, especially team leader, Val Florea for the great day.

When your board members and officers attended Triennial in Spokane last year, we were so inspired by the story of African activist, Leymah Gbowee, winner of numerous awards including the Nobel Peace Prize, that we wanted to share her story with those of you who could not attend. Leymah, and thousands of women came together in the middle of

a bloody war in Liberia, Africa. These women were crucial to bringing about peace in their country as they staged silent non-violent protests and prayer vigils demanding an end to their country's civil war. We viewed her story in the film, *Pray the Devil Back to Hell*. We also viewed a video of her powerful speech to the Women of the ELCA at the Triennial Convention in Spokane, Washington, in July of 2011. She is living proof of how a grassroots peaceful activism can alter the history of a nation.

Amy Chisholm, Developmental Director of Project Harmony in Omaha spoke to the group about how their organization brings together in one site all the professionals who are available to help a child in crises. This means that a child only has to tell his or her story one time.

Phillip Rislvedt of the local Thrivent Financial office talked to the group about some of the services available through Thrivent Financial. The Thrivent Financial office furnished our morning donuts and also folders for the day. We appreciated their generosity.

Joyce Olson, a member of a clown ministry engaged the group in some fun activities that everyone enjoyed.

Rockin' Region 4 Presidents and VPs together in Nebraska

It was Nebraska's turn to host the yearly weekend retreat of the Region 4 Synodical Organizations' presidents and vice-presidents. President Kandy stepped up to the task of organizing a full agenda for our guests from Kansas, Oklahoma, Arkansas, and Texas, representing five of the six synods in our region. Gwen Edwards, CWO Executive Board Member, and Jackie Wilson, CWO Secretary, also joined us.





Everyone converged on Omaha by car and plane on Friday, July 13. Our first stop was Table Grace Café, where we enjoyed a delicious lunch of gourmet pizza, salad, and soup. Matt Weber explained the concept of this unique community restaurant ministry where there are no set prices. A donation box sits on the counter and people are encouraged to donate as they are able and to help serve if they aren't. They also offer a training program to help people get jobs in food service. It is not a "handout" but a "hand up" concept. While eating, we also heard about the Synod's Metropolitan Ministries' program for Hispanic women. Rev. Dr. Damon Laaker explained that the

program was successful because they asked the women themselves what type of program they would like instead of planning a program and then asking women to come. Pastor John Backus of north Omaha's Trinity Lutheran Church told us about his church's ministry to north Omaha youth and the Sudanese community. The Nile Lutheran Church (a community of Nuer-speaking Sudanese worshipers) gather as Mission Partners in Trinity's building.

Next stop was Nebraska City to Arbor Day Farm Tree Adventure to give our guests a little Nebraska history. That evening was spent at the Lied Lodge. Philip Ristvedt of Thrivent Financial for Lutherans led us through a short workshop titled *Making a Difference, Sharing your time, talents and treasures* before our dinner sponsored by Thrivent. Kandy shared a devotion on talking hands (http://www.juliabettencourt.com/dev/handsdev.html) and later Terri had devotions based on our Women of the ELCA logo and purpose statement. Our group discussed the Women of the ELCA's 25th anniversary and it wasn't long before our idea sprang to life.



Saturday, we began with breakfast at First Evangelical Lutheran Church in Nebraska City followed by a walk through the woods at the Tree Adventure. Refreshed, we polished our \$25 for 25 years idea back at the Lied Lodge, with sack lunches furnished by St. Paul's of Auburn. Then it was on to Camp Carol Joy Holling for that evening. Mary Mayfield and her husband, Nick, treated us to a great picnic supper around the campfire, including s'mores. Our evening devotion focused on folding the American Flag. Plan your Thankoffering service to reach the larger community by Emma Crossen

The new Thankoffering Service is printed and ready for use. You can find it in the stewardship guide, *Providing for Mission and Ministry*, and download it from *womenoftheelca.org*. The Thankoffering service is one of our most important and historic traditions, rooted in our celebration of generosity, gratitude and community. When we invite others to join our Thankoffering event, we welcome them to learn about and participate in the mission and ministry of Women of the ELCA. As you plan your next Thankoffering event, consider this question:

How can our Thankoffering event include women, men and children who do not regularly attend Women of the ELCA events?

Include new women on the planning team.

Helping with the Thankoffering service is a good way for newcomers to learn about Women of the ELCA and for women in your unit to build new relationships. For instance, do you know a mom who is involved with Sunday School but does not attend your unit meetings? Invite her to join the team and help plan a children's activity during the service. Do you know a gifted singer? Invite her to sing for the service and help plan the music.

Invite men and children.

Women of the ELCA is a community of women whose mission and ministry impacts the whole church, men and children included. The Thankoffering service is an opportunity to invite people of all ages to give thanks for their blessings, learn about Women of the ELCA and donate to support the churchwide women's organization. Often men welcome the opportunity to give in honor or memory of their mothers, wives or sisters.

Make the invites personal.

In addition to announcing the event on Sunday morning and publishing it in the church newsletter, find ways to personally invite guests, such as handwritten invitations, phone calls and individual emails. The guests might be personal friends or family, neighbors or people from other congregations and anyone who is likely to enjoy the service and support the mission of Women of the ELCA.

Include children and mothers.

Include children in your event by adding a children's sermon about gratitude, inviting the children's choir to sing or asking children to help collect the offering. Provide childcare during the service so that mothers of young children can attend. Invite children to participate in a structured childcare activity during the service, like decorating their very own Thankoffering container. Highlight some of the ways that Women of the ELCA ministries impact children and families.

Make time to decorate Thankoffering containers.

Invite attendees to make a Thankoffering container to take home and use throughout the next year. Set up a craft station before or after the service, or invite Sunday School classes to decorate containers ahead of time, using boxes, jars, or canisters and simple craft supplies. For more ideas on creating Thankoffering containers, visit *womenoftheelca.org*.

Promote the daily practice.

At its fullest, the Thankoffering is not only a once-a-year event, it's a daily practice! Individuals set aside small offerings at home to give thanks for the blessings of that day or week. At the annual Thankoffering event, they combine their offerings and the unit sends the full amount to the churchwide women's organization. Use your Thankoffering event to tell people about this daily Thankoffering practice.

Get names and follow up.

Record the names and contact information for everyone who attends. After the Thankoffering service, make a plan to follow up and thank them for attending. You can also use this list to send invitations to the next Thankoffering service and to other Women of the ELCA events.

Saved To Serve Opportunity Participants Prepare Lutheran Service Corps For New Volunteers

A cleaner, safer, and more welcoming place to call home for eleven incoming volunteers was the result of the Lutheran Service Corps Saved to Serve Opportunity in Omaha August 3-5.

Director Jan Donmeyer complemented the efforts of the participants saying, "The house looks GREAT! The shower downstairs looks fantastic. I can't tell you how nice it is to have the house ready to go."

Lutheran Service Corps in Omaha is part of a national organization that matches volunteers with full-time positions in social justice organizations for one year. The volunteers live together in a former convent where they share meals and household responsibilities. They each receive a small monthly stipend to cover basic needs but simple and sustainable living practices are encouraged and needed.

For the 2012-2013 year, eleven volunteers will be living in the house, an increase from

prior years, making it necessary to convert a room previously used as a library into a bedroom.

Fourteen women from across Nebraska met at the house for a Saved To Serve Opportunity aimed at cleaning and preparing the facility for the new residents. Outside, they reclaimed part of the yard and the use of the clothesline by trimming bushes and trees.

On the two floors of living space, they cleaned all the bedrooms, moved and reorganized the library, vacuumed and shampooed the carpets, cleaned kitchen

Social Media Tip

How to start a Facebook profile

ou've decided to join the Facebook fun club. Your kids are posting photos and videos of their families; your neighbors are learning the scoop about local store openings before you do; and your best friends are downloading free Kindle books. You want some of that, and we're going to help.

Below are instructions for creating a Facebook account. But first you'll need a couple of things: an email address and a photo. The photo is not really necessary, but without it, you'll look like the novice to Facebook that you actually are. Full disclosure: Many of the steps below are taken directly from Facebook's help page and not created by this writer (a brilliant step saver in her opinion).

- 1. To sign up for a brand new account, enter your name, birthday, gender and email address into the form on www.facebook.com. Then pick a password (see step 2). After you complete the sign up form, Facebook will send an email to the address you provided. Click the confirmation link to complete the sign up process.
- 2. To make sure your password is strong, create one that is at least six characters in length. Use a complex string of numbers, letters and punctuation marks. If Facebook alerts you that the password you entered is not strong enough, try mixing uppercase and lowercase letters or making your password longer. Ideally, the password you select should be easy for you to remember but hard for someone else to figure out. For added security, your Facebook password should also be different than other passwords that you use on the Internet. Important: Write your password down and put it in a secret place (but not so secret that you'll forget where you've put it).
- 3. Add a profile picture. Probably Facebook will ask you to add a photo as you create your account. So have a favorite picture of yourself (or your dog or your cat or a tree or a sunset) available on your computer desktop for uploading to your new account. If you skipped that step as you were creating an account, do it now by:

Going to your new profile (timeline) and mousing over your profile picture (or silhouette); Clicking on "Edit Profile Picture" and

Uploading a new photo that you previously saved to your desktop.

- 4. After you sign up for Facebook, you simply must log in at www.facebook.com to see what your friends are doing. Find a friend through the search bar at the top left of the page. Click on your name at the top right of the page to see your personal timeline; click on the home button to see your friends' posts to your wall; and click on the "pull-down" arrow for Facebook helps and more instruction about your account and privacy settings.
