Read Revelation 2:1-7

# THE PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Advent is my favorite church season, a time to prepare for the birth of our Savior—baby Jesus. Advent enables us a time to reflect, study, and prepare. This time of year sometimes also causes us to get caught up in the preparations for Christmas; that we forget to take time to be still and feel Christ's heart within us.

My family traveled to Texas in December to spend time with family. We took time to rest, play games, and read the Word. Our hearts went out to you as many of your Christmas Eve services were canceled or postponed. We attended a standing room only Christmas Eve service in San Antonio, sitting in the front row... my nine-year-old selected the seats and Grandma said okay. Our seats had an interesting view of the organist and Aaron was



intrigued by watching her feet dance across the pedals. Once we were home for the evening and before writing that last letter to Santa Claus, we read the Word together as a family, the story of Jesus' birth; it was our time to reflect on the Word.

Another preparation my family did in December was worshipping with Peder Eide twice while he was in Omaha. Peder's new song *Why Wouldn't I* is about why parents adopt children. However, every time I hear that song, I am hearing Jesus singing it to me. In fact, one verse does refer to how we were orphans until we became God's children—"All of us were orphans too. Til in our darkness love broke through." The song talks about why wouldn't the adopted parent travel so far to bring home their new child. When I hear it my heart is hearing, God telling me why wouldn't He leave the flock to get me, the one sheep, to bring his daughter home. Chorus—"Why wouldn't I travel so far to where you are. Call you my own, why wouldn't I? ... When I saw your face, when I heard your cry..." Those words are the same thoughts God has for us, His children. This song is so touching to my heart and my spiritual walk, it causes me to cry when I hear it—knowing and remembering how much Jesus loves me.

Luke 15:3-4, "Then Jesus told them this parable: "Suppose one of you has a hundred sheep and loses one of them. Does he not leave the ninety-nine in the open country and go after the lost sheep until he finds it?" He will travel so far to bring us home.

In those times when we don't know what to pray and we just cry out to the Lord, He hears us. Romans 8:26-27, "In the same way, the Spirit helps us in our weakness. We do not know what we ought to pray for, but the Spirit himself intercedes for us with groans that words cannot express. And he who searches our hearts knows the mind of the Spirit, because the Spirit intercedes for the saints in accordance with God's will."

Advent is over, Epiphany has past, and we are watching and waiting for the snow and ice to melt. Northeast Nebraska is still getting ice storms and Sidney didn't get as much snow as we did in Bellevue. The schools are discussing how they will make up the days, and while our calendars and schedules are getting back into the routine, we still need to remember to take time to reflect, study, and prepare.

So pull out those calendars and mark Spring Gatherings, Saved to Serve Opportunities, and Autumn Renewal on your calendar. The ladies have been busy planning the Spring Gatherings to help us to live, laugh, and love. Saved to Serve team is enabling us to help Mosaic and NLOM. Autumn Renewal will enable us to learn about living and loving in Tanzania.

Thank you to all of you who mentor me, support me, and pray for me. As the board begins their work for 2010, I ask that you pray for them, for us. That we hear God's voice, feel Christ's heart, as we do His work in Nebraska.

Since 1998, the Nebraska Synodical Women's Organization has committed to provide at least two Saved to Serve Opportunities every year through partnership with ELCA supported institutions and agencies.

Believing that faith without action is not alive, we commit ourselves to provide opportunities for participants to share their gifts and experiences as they grow in their faith journey by:

- ➤ Reinforcing the connection between our faith and our actions by intentionally becoming involved with our neighbors.
- Building relationships with people of diverse ages, cultures, and situations.
- ➤ Initiating partnerships with the social service agencies of the Nebraska Synod ELCA, as well as with agencies in our communities and beyond.
- Providing times for participants to share their experiences at convention, Spring Gatherings, and congregational unit meetings.
- ➤ Including Bible study as a key component at each event.
- Remembering always that we are **Saved to Serve**.

NSWO's hope is to model servant type activities that can be adopted and altered to fit the needs of conferences and congregational units for service in their communities.

Two 2010 Saved to Serve Opportunities were announced at the NSWO Convention luncheon on Saturday, September 26, 2009.

Mosaic is an affiliated social ministry organization of the ELCA. Mosaic provides residential, vocation, medical, spiritual, social, and advocacy support to people with intellectual and developmental disabilities.

New group homes are being added in Grand Island, however, before that can happen, an existing intensive care facility is in need of some tender caring touches.

Traci Dusatko from Mosaic invited the ladies to come to Grand Island, May 21 to 23, to assist with refreshing and refurbishing of a group home. We will be refreshing a kitchen, painting hallways and bedrooms, and staining a privacy fence and screen house. We will interact with the Mosaic clients, perhaps play games, have a sing-a-long, and attend church with them. Congregational units may assist with the project by providing the following tangibles or monies to purchase soaps, shampoos, lotions, laundry detergents, and paper products.

Nebraska Lutheran Outdoor Ministries is called to provide places set apart for people of all ages to grow in Christ. NLOM encourages spiritual renewal of the whole person by providing encounters with the Word, nurturing an awareness of creation as God's gift, and offering opportunities for worship, recreation, and the development of relationships.

Casey Fuerst from NLOM Camp Carol Joy Holling invited our ladies to come and visit their facilities outside Ashland and assist with sprucing up the camp the weekend of the Quilt Auction, July 30 to August 1. We will be washing windows, sanitizing the kitchens, and making things sparkle for the visitors at the Quilt Auction. Participants will have the opportunity to tour the camp, attend part of the auction, and we hope enjoy the outdoors and a campfire setting. We will be housed at the Sjogren Retreat Center.

If you can't personally attend the Saved to Serve Opportunity, your unit can assist in providing tangibles for Camp Carol Joy Holling. They need anti-bacterial pump soap containers,

liquid dish soaps (Dawn, Palmolive), powdered laundry detergent, Clorox spray, paper towels, dark colored wash cloths, pillow protectors,



household brooms and dustpans, or monetary contributions towards nice vacuums.

Whether you can attend or not, you can help fulfill people's dreams. Have you ever had a "dream" list, a list of things that you would love to have but your budget will not allow? Wouldn't it be great to help obtain some of these dream list items for the agencies we are serving? This year, all undesignated cash donations will go towards the purchase of a wheelchair swing for Mosaic or vacuum cleaners for Camp Carol Joy Holling.

# TIMES ARE A-CHANGING!

I doubt there is a unit of the Women of the ELCA that would disagree with "times are a-changing," including the women of **Lord of Love Lutheran Church** in **Omaha**. In recent years and for a

variety of reasons, we found it was becoming more difficult to recruit officers and to fill all of the mission secretary positions for our W/ELCA unit. The names of those on the board varied little over the years, and although we definitely could say we had a "successful" women's ministry, it was far from ideal. Among other things, how could we encourage more women, including younger women, to become more active in the women's ministry?



We had done a good job in involving other groups at Lord of Love, including the youth group, men's group, children, and families. We had developed some innovative programs, even some of these were becoming a burden. A relatively small group of women were doing many things and we were beginning to see the wear and tear on our leadership. It was time for a change.

We started small. Just the name "Lord of Love Women of the ELCA" was a scary concept to many...it sounded so formal, a word that has never described us at Lord of Love! So three years ago, we adopted the name, "Women of Love." It fits us!



Within the board, we began to discuss alternative types of leadership. Could we take what had become a "burden" to the officers and reshape it? Could those of us who had been around a long time begin to mentor younger women into leadership? How could we become more effective in carrying out our mission as Women of the ELCA? As it became clear that we were looking at a team-oriented style of organization, a sub-committee was tasked with developing proposed changes.

The next step was to evaluate our programming. At our annual planning session in November 2008, we filled sheets of paper taped to the walls—what were our projects/programs during 2008; what were some of the other things we had done in recent years; what projects/programs would we like to do in 2009? Then we posted the W/ELCA mission and purpose statements and item by item we asked ourselves, "how does this fit in with our mission and purpose?" Some items easily fit, others were dropped immediately, and others fell under "it's nice however it takes too much time, and there are other groups that could do it." We did some serious pruning, and dropped some things we had been doing for a long time. With a leaner program/project list, things were looking up.

In March 2009 the board presented a proposed constitution and by-law revision at our Women of Love business meeting. After good discussion and questions, the group voted to approve the changes with a second reading and final vote to be taken at the fall business meeting. In the meantime, we began shifting to the team ministry format and found that we were able to involve some other women. For instance, one of the Lutheran Bible study groups took over the planning for our Epiphany potluck program. We also discovered other groups, such as the Sunday school staff, picked up a couple of projects the women had chosen not to continue.

In October 2009, the women voted unanimously to adopt the revised constitution and by-laws, with a starting date of January 1, 2010, for the new ministry team. Following that meeting, a list of tasks for the team coordinators was developed for the ministry team orientation/program planning session, which was held in November. This is not a permanent list, but it will be reviewed and fine-tuned by each new ministry team.

Each person took the Spiritual Gifts Inventory (available online at http://www.elca.org/Growing-In-Faith/Ministry/Women-of-the-ELCA/All-our-resources/Affirming-Our-Gifts/Spiritual-Gifts-Discovery.aspx). We also discussed our passions in ministry, and then matched them and our spiritual gifts results with the coordinator positions and their descriptions. The women chose the areas in which they felt comfortable and called. Not only were all the coordinator positions filled, also others volunteered to assist in these tasks and on subcommittees.

It's just a beginning, however, after having just completed four years as the president (four one-year terms); I am encouraged, hopeful, and prayerful as I watch this new team. Our ministry team coordinator and assistant coordinator are younger women; three members of the team are "new" to women's ministry leadership; and there are a couple of us "old-timers" available to mentor. Times are a-changing and for the better.
