Shine Your Light

The sewing women of Our Savior Lutheran Church in Wayne, has a small group that meet on a monthly basis. They strive to engage in ministry and action to promote healing and wholeness in the church, the society, and the world by providing quilts and lap robes to those in need. This past year, they quilted two quilts and a church member donated two quilts to Camp Carol Joy Holling raising, \$3,775 for the

camp. They also did a quilted quilt for Camp Tomah Singa in Kansas which sold for \$535. They gave thirty-four tied quilts and eighteen lap robes for two area fire victims, Wilderness Camp in Minnesota, MOSIAC, a Rescue Mission, Orphan Grain Train, and the National Youth Gathering in New Orleans. With the help of the congregation they were able to send three sewing kits, 10 quilts, twenty-nine health kits to LWR and \$550 to Project Comfort.

## A Story to Share

I was a "first time" attendee to this year's Nebraska Synodical Women's Organization Convention in Kearney and it will forever be engraved on my heart and mind. I personally witnessed and experienced the Holy Spirit moving among the women there and felt the need to share my story with you.

I was not a delegate so chose to spend some of my time in the Servant Room tying fleece blankets. On Saturday morning, I joined nine other women sitting around a table cutting and tying blankets. The conversation led to the auction items and we all commented on items we had placed bids on. I said I was interested in the beautiful walnut Nativity set donated by Hope Lutheran from Burr, Nebraska. I said that my seven year old grandson was blind and I was sure he could feel the details in each piece of the scene. One woman asked if my grandson had been born blind. I said "No, he was born with sight but he has a terminal degenerative brain disease." As strong as I'd like to think I am when telling others this, my voice cracked and I struggled not to shed tears. I simply left the table for a brief moment to regain composure. Nothing more was discussed about my grandson.

The Nativity scene was eventually priced "out of my reach" and I resolved it was not meant for me. I was happy to see someone else valued it that would appreciate it. The bidding closed at 6:00 p.m. and my friend, Barb Kahlandt (our delegate), asked me to take her check into the auction area and pay for her items she had bid on and won. I grabbed her auction items and when I approached Heather Abbott to pay for Barb's items, Heather noticed my name tag and said "I have something for you!" She turned around and handed me that beautiful Nativity scene! She told me that someone who wanted to remain anonymous had purchased it for my grandson and asked Heather to give it to me! I was so overcome with emotions and joy—all at once. Once again, my strong resolve melted and I began to sob uncontrollably...sweet Heather came around the table to hug me and to let me know that this was God's Spirit moving among us. I asked for the person's name so I could thank them personally but Heather declined my request, saying "They wanted to bless you and your grandson anonymously." I returned to my hotel room with the Nativity scene, with prayers of praise and thanksgiving for whoever blessed us so richly.

People ask our family how we get through such devastating news? Some days are better than others but we ALWAYS see God at work in and around us each day. It comes from the love and actions of those around us who give us hope. God's faithfulness is revealed to us in so many amazing ways.....that wonderful Nativity scene has been one of them. Our grandson, Oliver, loves it. He especially loves how the baby Jesus lays in the cradle or can be lifted out of it to hold. He takes "Baby Jesus" to bed with him most nights.

If possible, Kandy, could you please print a special **Thank You** to the individual or possibly the group who purchased the Nativity scene for Oliver in the next *Expressions* newsletter? Their very generous and heartfelt gift was such a blessing to him and our family. Our theme this year was "Sing a New Song"—Psalm 149:1, each of us have much to praise God in song for. I sing for my sisters in Christ!

# Saved To Serve Opportunity Focuses on Lincoln Prison Ministry Programs By SUSAN WATSON

Chances are you know someone who is or has been in prison. What is it like to be incarcerated—sometimes for years, to be free again, to struggle to return to living in the community, to be supported by fellow Christians, and to draw strength from a relationship with God?

The Saved to Serve Opportunity (STSO) held August 9 to 11 gave women from across Nebraska new insights into these and other aspects of prison life and ministry.

For many, one of the most memorable experiences was worshiping along side prisoners at the Nebraska State Penitentiary as Pastor Bob Bryan led the Followers of Christ Prison Ministry service. The STSO group sang as a choir during the service with the accompaniment of Pastor Bryan's wife, Audrey.

Our Saviour's Lutheran Church served as the program base for the weekend which began with an informative panel narrated by Pastor Bryan who is also the Director of Prison Ministry for the Nebraska Synod.

Panel members included three former inmates who shared their stories, representative from Our Saviour's who told how a prison ministry came to be started by the Congregation and staff and volunteers with the FEAST ministry and the Bridges To Hope Warehouse.

FEAST stands for Friends Eating And Singing, studying and sharing Together. Each week a bus from Our Saviour's brings inmates eligible for religious passes from the Community Corrections Center Lincoln to the Church for worship, a meal, a

time for singing and prayers, and a time for Bible or book study.

Saved To Serve Opportunity participants joined in all the Sunday activities plus helped with the meal. Sandy Olson led the group in preparing, cooking, and serving the

meal which was one of four serving options.

Other participants worked with Volunteer Mary Barton at the Bridges Hope Warehouse where they helped process donations brought from Women of the ELCA units across the state, assembled kitchen kits, completed and mailing to raise funds to support the Warehouse.

Jan Riedman, the director of outreach

ministries for Our Saviour's, hosted a group that cleaned the kitchen blinds, stove, refrigerator, cupboards, and floor at the House for Sober Living, a transitional house for drug or alcohol addicts.

Another group went with Pastor Bryan to the House of New Life, a transitional house for sex offenders, where they cleaned and polished cupboards and painted a hall.

St. Andrews Lutheran Church provided places for the group to eat, sleep, hold choir practice, relax and enjoy an enlightening multipart Bible study on grace led by June Baumgartner. The study centered around the song *Amazing Grace* by John Newton.

The Lincoln congregations of Sheridan, Grace, First and Spirit of Hope also provided meals.

The NSWO Vision Trip to our Companion Synod, Tanzania is now a reality. Are you being called to visit our sisters in Christ in Tanzania? The dates are set and a tentative itinerary has been planned for June 9 to 24, 2014. Coordinators for this Vision Trip will be Sandy Olson, NSWO Global Missions Coordinator and myself along with Bill Davis, the Nebraska Synod Companion Synod contact.

- \* The question is "What is a Vision Trip?" A Vision Trip to Tanzania is to learn about the culture of Tanzania and the ministries of the North Diocese. A "Vision Trip" is different from a "Mission Trip." We will not step off the plane and set about building a church or a school but will be building relationships. We are traveling to Tanzania to learn from our brothers and sisters in Christ, to pray and worship with them, to bring encouragement, support, and love.
- \* Question number two is: "What will we do and what will we see?" Here is the tentative itinerary for the trip:

June 11 – Single Mother's Group & Ushirika wa Neema Deaconess Centre Visits

June 12 – Nronga Women's Group, Houses for Health, Neema Orphanage, Machame Hospital and School of Nursing Visits

June 13 – Women's School at Himo, Mwika Bible College, Mwika Market, Agape Visits

June 14 – Gezaulole & Siha Women's Group, Angaza, Hai, Faraja Visits

June 15-16 – Villages - Worship and Visits

June 17 – Depart for Safari, lunch at Mwangaza in Arusha

June 18-21 – Safari

June 22 – All Day Worship in Village Parishes

June 23 – Office of the Women Department, Mosaic Visit; Depart for Kilimanjaro Airport

The next most asked question is "How much will it cost?" Approximate cost is \$4,500 per person; cost covers airfare, visa, ground transportation, all lodging and meals. Individuals are responsible for securing a passport, inoculations, and oral anti-malarial medication taken during the trip. Trip payment schedule:

\$600 – due now to reserve your spot on the trip (deposit is non-refundable)

\$950 – due November 11, 2013

\$2,000 – due February 28, 2014 (this payment covers your plane ticket and is non-refundable)

\$950 – due May 30, 2014

\* The next question is "Are there any scholarships available?" NSWO will offer twenty - \$1,000 grants for Nebraska ELCA women traveling on this trip. Grant Application forms are available by contacting Vision Trip Coordinators Sandy Terry or Sandy Olson.

Is God calling you to visit our sisters in Tanzania? Seek a quiet place and spend time in prayer asking the Holy Spirit to guide your decision. As you visit with others who have visited Tanzania a common response will be, once you visit our brothers and sisters of Tanzania you will fall in love with their faithful spirit and will be hooked!!
