Legislative Day Will be Feb. 12



For the next three years, our emphasis will continue to focus on what we can do to help women and children in crisis. This is a large area

to cover, when considering the many facets of crisis. Have you worked this emphasis into your program for the new year?

Consider supporting advocacy and action on behalf of at-risk children. Consider supporting prison ministries for women. Consider programs for women who have experienced abusive relationships. Consider living in poverty in our own communities as well as around the world. Consider advocating for congregations and social ministry organizations to provide adequate benefit packages to early childhood staff. Consider nonviolence education, and focus on leadership and safe havens for children. Consider mentoring one woman at a time with personal commitment, spiritual fellowship, and individual invitation.

There are so many resources to cover these areas (*Interchange*, Fall 1999, pages 22-23) including some probably in your own community.

Students Promoting Jubilee 2000

Jubilee 2000 has caught the attention of Lutheran students at Wayne State College, under the leadership of student Stephanie Lorenz and Pastor Paul Judson.

They have invited other Lutheran Campus Ministries across the state to participate and are seeking to organize a group of 12 Nebraska Lutheran student delegates to attend the J-2000 Rally in Washington, D.C. in April.

Help is being sought to raise \$5000 to fund the trip. Lorenz has asked if Women of the ELCA congregational units might be interested in donating. If for some reason the trip does not take place, she said the money would be used for other LCM projects across the state.

Contributions can be sent to Wayne Lutheran Campus Ministry, c/o Stephanie Lorenz, 1301 Shreiner Drive, Wayne NE 68787 Wayne students began their J-2000 activities with a letter-writing campaign in the campus student center. Students were asked to sign the J-2000 petition or write a letter to their representatives in Congress. A flier developed by Wayne Lutheran Campus Ministry was distributed.

Lorenz has agreed to serve as a member of the Women of the ELCA Jubilee 2000 Speakers Bureau, so is available to speak to units either before or after the trip.



'Forgive Us Our Debts as We Forgive Our Debtors'

Jubilee 2000/USA

Jubilee 2000/USA is a part of a world-wide movement of concerned people and groups (including the ELCA) seeking to cancel the international debts of the poorest countries through a fair and accountable process by the end of the year 2000.

The Jubilee 2000 movement draws its inspiration from the Biblical book of Leviticus which describes a Year of Jubilee every 50 years. In Leviticus the Jubilee year was a year in which slaves were freed, land was returned to its original owners, social inequalities were rectified and debts canceled.

Jubilee 2000 grows out of the concern of the ELCA and other groups about global fairness. In the year 2000, over 1.5 billion people are in poverty and 40 percent of the children in developing countries suffer from malnutrition. This is due in part to a crushing burden of debt.

Breaking the 'Chains' of Debt

In order to repay foreign debt many of the poorest countries are being forced to use money that would normally go to health care, education, roads and other vital services. Many children are then denied the chance to go to school. Pregnant women and children have no health care. HIV-infected people do not get counseling and treatment. There are no funds to maintain roads, which are in major need of repair.

How easy for us to go zooming down our roads and interstates for whatever we need whenever we need it, to get the health and education that we need whenever we want it! I have been in Tanzania and Haiti and believe me, the roads are bad – often impassable!

The real story of the debt burden does not lie in numbers and statistics, but rather in the ways in which women's lives — and therefore the lives of their families and communities — are impacted by debt. Women's multiple roles as mothers, wives, producers, sellers and community members mean that virtually every aspect of their lives has been impacted by the debt crisis. The diversion of scarce national resources from education and health to debt repayment has closed off educational opportunities for women and girls, threatened their health, and increased women's burden as care-givers and providers of education.

Two examples from Africa:

- Niger, the poorest country in the world, spends three times more money paying off their debt than for health care and education. One in three children born in Niger will die before they are five years old from hunger, measles, diarrhea, meningitis or a combination of the four. The burden of debt leaves little money for governments such as Niger to pay doctors or nurses or to purchase needed drugs.
- In Zambia, between 1990-1993, the government spent 34 times as much on debt service as it did on education. Since then education spending has decreased. Because women are responsible for paying school fees, the burden of primary school costs falls on them.

This is only a part of the picture of how the "chains" of debt are hurting women. Governments spend almost all of their resources paying back the debt. This causes interest rates to rise and this makes it harder for women to have credit, they can't afford it!

Why Should We Care?

If we do not support debt cancellation EVERY-ONE LOSES. The idea of crushing the "chains" of the debt burden is a matter of justice and compassion. We are globally connected with one another. What affects my brother and sister in another country affects me. Our own Companion Synod country of Tanzania is one of the African countries that is burdened by this debt.

These economic, social and environmental problems threaten the well-being of people everywhere. As the Jubilee 2000 movement states, "In Today's world, none of us can prosper for long unless all of us have the things that we need for lives of sufficiency and dignity. The debt burden carried by poor countries harms us all."

Jesus says in the Lord's Prayer: "Forgive us our debts as we forgive our debtors." Shouldn't we believe what our Savior has to say?

Debt burden motivates many poor countries to lower their labor standards. They are not good customers for US products or investment. The Ugandan Women's Network notes that unrepayable debt "discourages foreign direct in-

Jubilee Is Biblical

When I think of Jubilee 2000, I think of the verse in the Lord's Prayer: "Forgive us our debts as we forgive our debtors." What could be plainer than this? Jesus said it, I believe it! In this Lenten season I will think most about this question: What will I sacrifice so that others may have life?

vestment, affects commerce, stifles corruption and development of markets." That hurts the US farmer, workers and businesses as well as the people in the indebted countries.

How Do They Benefit? Jubilee 2000 will save 21 million children from disease and hunger in Africa alone. It will preserve the environment. Debt-induced poverty causes the exploitation of natural resources. Jubilee 2000 enables indebted countries to start with a "clean slate." These countries can have decent health care and education, basic human rights.

How Do We Benefit? Morally, we will know families are not being sacrified to send us money for debt repayment that they need for basic survival. But there are other benefits:

Jubilee 2000 would protect US jobs. Exports from rich countries to poorer nations would be much higher, that would boost manufacturing and employment in the north.

Greater stability and economic prosperity wouldmakelower-income countries better markets for goods and services, and less likely to erupt as trouble spots.

Canceling the debt will not harm us in any way. Although the debt for these countries is ENORMOUS to them, the amounts are small in relation to the wealth of a rich nation such as the United States.

Women Play Key Role

A key part in making this process work is that poor countries will play a signfigant role in deciding how these economic resources will be spent, and what the conditions for future loans will be. This has not happened before.

Women know in these countries that their governments probably will not pay any attention to the needs of the people even if/when debt relief happens. They are mobilizing, getting together and campaigning for change in their government systems. The WOMEN are the ones who are rallying the people, getting participation from the citizens to get together to work for better health care, education, roads.

We need to support these women with prayer, and the pen. Our Companion Synod of Tanzania has women working for these causes.

How Did Countries Get In Debt?

During the Cold War, Western governments including the U.S. often lent money to corrupt governments for political reasons and largely ignored how the borrowers used themoney. Manyleaders squandered money on badly designed projects, military spending or personal corruption.

While some poor countries have suffered from adverse weather and armed conflicts, virtually all have endured long-term declines in world prices for their primary exports like coffee or cotton. As export earnings dropped, governments could no longer keep up interest payments which were added to the unpaid principal of the debt.

This compounding of interest and rescheduling of loans has led to situations in many countries where, despite years of making debt payments, the level of indebtedness has not been reduced. Indeed for many countries the debt is higher now than ever.

To Whom Is the Money Owed?

- The world's wealthiest nations: The United States, Britain, Japan, France and Germany.
- •The World Bank, which is controlled by the world's wealthiest nations.
- Regional development banks and many commercial banks.

Nebraska Women Can Help

There are many things that congregations around Nebraska can do to help celebrate and educate themselves and those around them about "Jubilee 2000." Here are some, you may think of others:

- 1. Pray for our legislators and all those in political power. They hold the keys to cancelling the debt for these countries. Make a paper prayer "chain" to hang on the cross or somewhere in the sanctuary and use it in worship.
- 2. Read and study the Biblical verses listed on p. 2. Actively talk about reducing the debt.
- 3. Do a Congregational Sacrifice Chart and post it in the church. What are you, the members of your congregation, doing individually to sacrifice so that others may have life?
 - 4. Have a candlelight vigil for debt relief.
- 5. Write to your government leaders and representatives to ask for debt relief. Sample letter and addresses on *Expressions* page 7.
- 6. Have a Service of Thankfulness thanks for blessings received and calling for sharing those blessings with the poorest of the poor.

- 8. At Easter Think about how can we give new life and hope to others. Talk about communion, the cup of suffering that we ALL share,

Sample Jubilee 2000 Letter To Key Decision Makers

This sample below can be used as a model for letters that you personally or your organization can send to key policy makers such as the PRESIDENT, SECRETARY OF THE TREASURY, LEGISLATORS IN CONGRESS AND SENATORS. This information comes from the "JUBILEE 2000 Campaign." Keep the letter brief, no more than one page. You can add things such as your name or the name of your organization, specific action that you would like to see taken such as co-sponsoring Jubilee 2000. Policy makers do respond to you. The loss to debt service of funds for sustainable development makes the lives of people in many indebted countries far more difficult. 

One Midwife Kit

(Please use new or good condition clean used items) 1 36" sq. muslin or sheeting (no hemming necessary)

l bath towel (thinner type)

l wash cloth (thin)

2 cord ties: 8" narrow lengths of selvage or .25" twill tape

l bath size bar Ivory soap

l razor blade (single edge, safety - may be purchased at a home improvement store)

1 newborn stocking cap (keep handknit ones very small)
1 small cotton short sleeve shirt (to waist only as babies do not wear diapers)

l receiving blanket

l pair plastic or latex exam gloves (NOT kitchen gloves. check with doctor or dentist)

Pack items in a two gallon Ziplock bag (squeeze air out of bag before sealing). Pack kits tightly into a box of not more than 15. Mark: "Revised Midwife Kit" and tell number of kits. IF something is missing, please indicate what on outside of box. Ship to Global Health Ministries, at above address.

Sending Used Soap

Method 1. Package about 3"x5" bars out of small pieces in used sheer hosiery by tying a knot at each end.

Method 2. Remelting and molding:

Chip soap pieces in a food processor (outside or in a ventilated place). Put chips in boiling or meat roasting bag. Sprinkle in 1/2 to 1 cup water and knead to mix. Close bag. Leave for 24 hours to soften. Boil the bag for about 2 hours or until melted. Using glove potholders knead until smooth. Cut off a corner and pour into molds. (Molds can be small drink boxes, etc. Or line containers with waxed paper.)

How is your unit and/or congregation actively involved with youth?

Here are a few suggestions from my experience at Zion in Creighton. Each newborn on our cradle roll receives a parenting packet each year until they begin Sunday School at age 3. These are from the Augsburg Proclaim series, "Nurturing God's Child." All baptized infants receive a hand-quilted crib quilt from the women and a first "soft" Bible from a religious bookstore from the church. Kindergarteners receive a beginner's Bible and third graders the Good News version at a church service ceremony.

We're in our third year of "Secret Friends in Christ," where adults who register to participate are paired with Sunday School age through high school youth. Cards, notes of encouragement and small gifts are given anonymously throughout the school year. Identity is revealed at the close of serivce on the last Sunday in May. Refreshments and getting acquainted follow.

One of our Bible Study circles is sponsoring a Latin American child, a 12-year-old girl, through Child Reach.
